- (d) the extent to which the applicant has participated in regular training and professional development relevant to social work;

In order to qualify for registration through Substantial Equivalency, an applicant must possess a minimum of a university-level Bachelor degree based on a norm of a four year degree program (or three years in Quebec) with a minimum of 40% course credits in the liberal arts, humanities and social sciences.

2. The Social Work Profession

Minimum required: 18 credit hours

This content area refers to education related to the social work profession including ethics and practice standards. Education that supports entry-level, generalist, reflective practice that facilitates inter-professional collaboration is required.

- > Application of social work values and ethics in professional situations (6 credit hours)
- Practice methods and professional skills required for generalist practice at a beginning level of competence (6 credit hours)
- Awareness of self in terms of values, beliefs and experiences as these impact upon social work knowledge and practice (3 credit hours)
- Understanding of other related professions to facilitate inter-professional collaboration (3 credit hours)

3. Social Justice, Human Rights and Awareness of Oppression Minimum required: 6 credit hours
